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### **Making Sanitation Available for All**

Laguna Water provides different solutions to ensure everyone's access to proper sanitation

Water is an essential element for a healthy human life. Many think it is an abundant resource since 70% of the world is made up of water. However, fresh water — water that can be used for drinking, bathing, irrigation, and other human activities—only makes up three percent of the Earth's water resources. Two percent of which are frozen in glaciers, ice and snow, and the one percent left is the only water accessible for human consumption.

An important natural resource, water is continuously becoming scarcer as time passes by due to the rising population and irresponsible use and management. Naturally, as the global demand for water continues to grow, the amount of wastewater produced also increases.


One sad reality is that wastewater has been neglected for years. In spite of that, people are starting to realize the need to treat the water that they have used considering the apparent degradation and contamination of water resources; with direct implications to the socio-economic development of communities. A critical component of water management cycle, wastewater treatment has also been identified as a needed element for adequate sanitation.

Access to adequate sanitation is not a privilege but a human right. In the Philippines, most households get their water from groundwater sources. However, with an improperly designed septic tank, wastewater from households can directly contaminate the groundwater source. This poses serious threats to health and well-being of communities, most especially to children.

To make proper sanitation available, accessible, and affordable to all Lagunenses, Laguna Water proposes three waste water management options, namely: Sewage Management; Desludging Service; and Portable Toilet Solution. These will prevent people from having contact with the dangers of untreated wastewater.



### Sewage Management

Sewered systems are best offered to industrial parks, central business districts, and high-end gated communities, where laying of sewer pipes is more feasible. Through sewer networks, the wastewater directly flows to the Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) where it undergoes a cleaning process.

Currently, Laguna Water is managing the sewerage system of Laguna Technopark, Inc. (LTI), where it treats an average of 4.2 million liters of wastewater per day. The domestic wastewater of industrial plants, which mostly produce electronic parts, semiconductors, motor components and metal products, is conveyed through sewer pipelines to the treatment facility. A biological treatment technology that utilizes aerobic bacteria to degrade the organics in the wastewater is applied in the STP prior to being discharged to the Sta. Rosa River.



#### **Desludging Service**

Desludging is suited to open communities and subdivisions. A desludging truck periodically siphons two-thirds of the contents of the septic tank of each household in the area. The collected waste, known as septage, then undergoes treatment at the Septage Treatment Plant (SpTP).

To facilitate this service, Laguna Water upgraded its centralized domestic wastewater treatment plant in LTI to incorporate the septic sludge treatment for the desludging service. Stone collection, screening, and oil and grease removal were installed as pre-treatment into the facility to ensure that the solid wastes and scum present are added to extract the filtrate from the biosolids prior disposal as organic fertilizer. The filtrate separated from the dewatering unit then goes through the existing sewerage treatment facility for further biological treatment to meet the required effluent quality standards prior discharge. Currently, the full plant capacity of the SpTP is at 70 cubic meters per day.

#### Portable Toilet Solution

To address open defecation, Laguna Water is currently studying the feasibility of employing portable toilets to toilet-less households and installing a common acceptance station in the area where customers could transfer their toilets' contents. A desludging truck will regularly collect and transport the accumulated septage to the SpTP to ensure that the waste will undergo proper treatment prior to discharge.

The success of realizing the benefits of Laguna Water's sanitation solutions will depend on the full support and cooperation of every member of the community. Ensuring access to adequate sanitation provides a healthier and sustainable ecosystem for all. After all, more than a right, sanitation is everybody's responsibility.

## Denying access to proper sanitation is denying access to basic human right.

Sanitation is a fundamental element in achieving good health and well-being and environmental sustainability. It is a human right; it allows people to enjoy a livable environment that provides opportunities for continued growth and development. But more than a right, it is a responsibility of everyone to make sanitation available to all.

Despite its importance and the many benefits it brings to pociety, the World Health Organization/United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) Joint Monitoring Programme reported that the global challenge to halve the proportion of people without access to sustainable sanitation between 1990 and 2015 was not achieved. Thus, access to improved sanitation facilities remains to be a challenge to about 2.4 billion people.

In the Philippines, sanitation has been given little social and political attention. According to UNICEF, there are more than 30 million Filipinos that do not have proper sanitary facilities where 7.8 million do not have toilets, resorting to open defecation.

#### More than just having toilet

Defined by the Asian Development Bank as the hygienic measures of disposing human wastes in ways that do not harm the environment and general public health, sanitation should be viewed not just as the availability of toilet facilities and the practice of good hygiene. Rather, it should include the proper disposal and treatment of the wastewater, which is the waste produced from various human activities such as using the toilet, taking a bath, and washing of dishes and clothes.





Improving access to adequate sanitation is one of the indicators in achieving sustainable development by 2030. As stated in the Sustainable Development Goal No. 6, the target is to end open defecation and to decrease the proportion of untreated wastewater.

With this, everyone is expected to do their own share in ensuring that the wastewater is treated before it is discarded to the environment.

## Raising awareness on the importance of sanitation

One of the identified gaps in achieving sustainable sanitation is the lack of knowledge about it and its importance to society.

To address the lack of public awareness on the need for adequate sanitation, Laguna Water launched an information, education, and communication campaign entitled *Tamang Sanitasyon Equals Kalinisan, Kalusugan, at Kaunlaran ng Bayan (TSEK ng Bayan)* in February 2017.

TSEK ng Bayan underlines the detrimental impacts of untreated wastewater to human health, natural resources, water quality, and economic productivity. Prior to launching the campaign, Laguna Water conducted a survey, where it found out that many Lagunenses are not aware of the concept of wastewater and the need to treat it before it is discharged to the environment.

More than 200 people from the cities of Biñan, Santa Rosa, and Cabuyao attended the launch of *TSEK ng Bayan* program at Max's Restaurant, Balibago Complex, Santa Rosa, Laguna.

Experts in the fields of microbiology and environmental science were invited to share their knowledge about wastewater and its impacts to society.

Dr. Noel G. Sabino, Assistant Professor VII from the Institute of Biological Science, University of the Philippines Los Baños (UPLB) presented how improper management of septic tanks can lead to the contamination of drinking water. While Dr. Marissa J. Sobremisana, University Extension Specialist II from the School of Environmental Science and Management, UPLB, discussed the effects of wastewater to the natural bodies of water, particularly to Laguna Lake.

The launch of the sanitation campaign also served as an avenue to consult the public about Laguna Water's desludging service. Rheena Paola Go - Peñaranda, Laguna Water's *Used Water Operations Manager*, shared how the service will be made available to all communities, even to those belonging to the Base of the Pyramid.

To better understand the entire water management cycle, Laguna Water presented a video of its water and wastewater trail. The video presented the processes that water undergoes—how water is extracted from the source and distributed to the customers and what happens to water after its use and before it is discharged to a natural body of water.





### Encouraging more people to advocate sanitation

Reinforcing the need for improved sanitation focusing on the availability of toilet facilities, practice of good hygiene, regular desludging of septic tanks, and connection to a sewer network, Laguna Water brings its TSEK ng Bayan campaign to different areas in the Province of Laguna.

Aside from the discussion on sanitation, Laguna Water also includes its *Toka Toka* program as part of the campaign. In *Toka Toka*, the company presents four acts that people can do to help protect the environment including regular desludging of septic tanks, connecting to a sewer network, segregating of garbage, and informing others about the different ways to ensure sustainability of natural resources.

Since March 2017, Laguna Water has already conducted its *TSEK ng Bayan* program to the following cities and municipalities: Santa Rosa City, San Pablo City, Pangil, Mabitac, Pagsanjan, Victoria, Cavinti, San Pablo, and Liliw. To date, more than 1,000 Lagunenses have already been informed about the importance of having access to proper sanitation.

With the help of the Department of the Interior and Local Government, Laguna Water has also presented its *TSEK ng Bayan* program to local government officials and representatives during the workshop on Drafting of Septage Ordinance for the Local Government Units of Cavite, Laguna, and Rizal last April. The company was also invited to hold the same campaign for the barangay officials of the cities of San Perdro, Binan, Santa Rosa, Cabuyao, Calamba, and San Pablo during Septage Orientation for Barangay Officials in Laguna in September.

Through *TSEK* ng *Bayan*, Laguna Water initiates a valuable change in people's perspective about sanitation, thus, helping people understand their role in making sanitation sustainable and available to all.

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### **Providing Solutions for Sustainable Sanitation**

Laguna Water makes it in the Top 10 in Global Competition for Sustainable Development

Bringing pride to the Philippines, Laguna Water's "Portable Toilet Solution (PTS): Sustainable Sanitation for the Base of the Pyramid" has made it to the top 10 and was selected as a runner-up in the 2017 Ideas for Action, a global youth competition on innovative ideas for financing and implementing United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), organized by the World Bank Group and the Zicklin Center for Business Ethics Research at the Wharton School.

Besting almost 2000 teams from 125 countries, Laguna Water's TEAM SAVE (Sanitation Availability for Various Economies), composed of Used Water Operations Manager Rheena Paola Go-Peñaranda; Used Water Facility Managers Nariyah Marie Ilagan and Harriette Berdan; Territory Manager Glenny Ermita; Key Accounts Manager Havenlynne Garcia and Communications and Branding Specialist Dustin Ibañez, delivered an outstanding proposal on how adequate sanitation will be made available to all, most especially to families with low financial capacity.

"Sanitation remains to be a challenge to millions of Filipinos. Many do not have toilet facilities, thus resorting to open defecation. Furthermore, a lot of households do not practice proper treatment of wastewater. These lead to various health and environmental problems and economic losses," said Rheena Peñaranda.

Guided and mentored by the originator of the PTS, Laguna Water President Virgilio Rivera, Jr., the proposed solution aims to help Filipinos gain access to proper sanitation. The main idea is to provide low-income communities with PTS anchored on a Utility Business Model with two levels of cross-subsidy; (1) between water supply and sanitation services and; (2) across customer classes, to make it available and affordable for all.

Judged by a panel consisting of senior World Bank, Wharton, and private sector executives from the Philippines' PTS idea, together with this year's best proposals, will be published in the 2017 Ideas for Action book.

Geared towards the realization of sustainable sanitation for all, Laguna Water has already started its study on the Portable Toilet Solution. Additionally, the company is set to provide desludging service to the entire Province of Laguna, hence, its sewage treatment plant has been upgraded to include a fully-mechanized septage treatment facility.

Ideas for Action is an annual competition that encourages the youth to contribute in the achievement of SDGs, and provides students and young professionals from around the globe opportunity to design financing solutions that will help shape the international development agenda.

# Bringing Sanitation Closer to Low Income Families

Laguna Water receives over P30-M grant from Canada for its Portable Toilet Solution Project



As part of the grant given by Grand Challenges Canada, Laguna Water conducted a Sanitation Summit for residents of low-income communities in Santa Rosa, Laguna.

Laguna Water's Portable Toilet Solution (PTS), a project dedicated to address the lack of proper sanitation services and facilities in low-income populations, was recently announced as a recipient of a PhP30 million funding for being chosen as one of the five projects under "Urban Sanitation Challenge" of the Water Engine Innovation, a pioneering partnership between Australian Aid, Grand Challenges Canada, and the Global Innovation Fund.

The PTS project offers to resolve the insufficient access to proper sanitation, a challenge experienced by millions of Filipinos belonging to the base of the pyramid. Many families across the country who do not have toilet facilities in their own homes are forced to resort to open defecation. This practice often leads to various diseases and health problems, and even dire environmental consequences.

Laguna Water sees to promote availability and affordability of sanitation services and facilities,

and sustainability of the program by encouraging support from public private partnership and community involvement.

To date, the water company has already started the study and testing of two PTS designs from LIXIL Japan and Loowatt United Kingdom. This lays the initial work to determine an affordable technology and portable toilet design that is most suited for the targeted Filipino community recipients.

With the support from Grand Challenges Canada, Laguna Water will pilot this project to 30 families in Laguna with no toilet facilities, and plans to expand it and cater at least 30,000 households.

Grand Challenges Canada, funded by the Government of Canada and other organizations, provides financial support to innovators in low- and middle-income countries and Canada. To date, it has supported more than 800 innovations in more than 80 countries which have the potential to save up to 1 million lives and improve up to 28 million lives by 2030.

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# Ensuring Safety and Cleanliness of Drinking Water

Laguna Water becomes the first and only private institution for Radiological Analysis of Drinking Water

Laguna Water announced that its Laboratory Services is the first and only private institution to offer Radiological Analysis for Drinking Water, after receiving its Radioactive Material License for Liquid Scintillation Counter and accompanying radioisotopes from the Philippine Nuclear Research Institute.

Radiological Analysis is one of the primary parameters under the 2017 Philippine National Standards for Drinking Water. It monitors radioactivity in drinking water, thus, protecting the public from unwarranted exposure to radiation.

According to Laguna Water Laboratory Services Manager Cyril A. Erica, the granting of Radioactive Material License is a significant milestone not only for the company but for the water industry. This license authorizes Laguna Water to acquire, receive, posses, own, and use radioactive materials necessary for Radiological Analysis.

"Currently, we are undergoing trainings to build-up our competencies in conducting Radiological Analysis. Starting next year, we will start to offer this service to Manila Water subsidiaries and other companies that are in need of the said test."

Established in 2010, Laguna Water Laboratory Services ensures that the water supplied to Laguna Water customers conforms to the national and international standards and regulations of water quality, for drinking and environmental purposes.

A Department of Health-accredited partner for water testing and analysis, Laguna Water Laboratory Services has consistently received excellent rating for its Proficiency Testing from the National Reference Laboratory- East Avenue, a Philippines' reference laboratory for environmental, occupational health, toxicology and micronutrient assay.

Laguna Water Laboratory Services will start offering Radiological Analysis for Drinking Water in January 2018.



Laguna Water, Water.org, and WaterLinks Target to Connect 1,500 Low-income Families to a Safe and Clean Source of Water

Manila Water Philippine Ventures, Water.org, and WaterLinks pool their resources together to connect at least 1,500 low-income families to the piped water system of Laguna Water.

The joint project dubbed as Water Connect, which is currently being implemented in Laguna, aims to support Filipino families who do not have enough means to gain access to reliable water source. The project, which seeks to provide access to clean water supply, will not only ensure good health and safety but will also promote community-organizing as well as provide technical advice and financial services to targeted marginalized communities.

Spearheading this project are three experts in the water industry namely: Manila Water Philippine Ventures, Water.org, and WaterLinks.

Manila Water Philippine Ventures is a wholly owned subsidiary of Ayala-led Manila Water whose mission is to provide the water supply and wastewater management requirements of geographies outside Metro Manila. Meanwhile, Water.org is an international non-profit organization that has positively transformed more than five million lives around the world through the provision of access to safe water and sanitation. WaterLinks is a fully independent, non-profit organization that facilitates water operator partnerships in the Asia-Pacific region and catalyzes efficiency improvements to enhance and expand access to urban water and sanitation services. Microfinance institutions will also be tapped to provide further assistance to families who would want to be part of this initiative.

To date, more than of 350 households has been connected to Laguna Water's network with the help of the WaterConnect project. With the positive response of Lagunenses, the WaterConnect team eyes to reach more communities in Laguna and to bring the project to other provinces in the country.


